

President of Fert from 2008 to 2017.
He saw Fert's origin and mission as follows:
"The idea of helping farmers in developing
countries develop so they can first feed
their families and feed their countries came
quite naturally to us. Grain growers were
aware of how fortunate they were to have
capacities that others didn't. So, as soon as
they had the opportunity, they undertook
to help their counterparts develop—but without doing

the work for them. Fert wasn't created solely by grain growers: we've always sought to surround ourselves with experts from other sectors of the economy. This gives us a

different perspective on agricultural development issues." Henri de Benoist has passed on to us the values that are the foundation of Fert's action. He especially liked to remind farmers and their organizations of the importance of not depending on others: "Depend on yourself and your own strengths; that's the guarantee of your freedom and independence."

We will strive, as he asked us, to have the courage and the will to continue our work to support farmers in need and who take charge of their future.

In this report, we are pleased to present the actions carried out in 2023 with some 66,000 farming families in 9 countries, including Georgia, where civil society is now struggling for a European future.

We would like to express our very sincere thanks to all those who have given us their support over the long term, in particular Unigrains, Agence française de développement, and the Louis Dreyfus corporate foundation.

An agri-agency

Fert was created following exchanges between leaders of grain-grower organizations and some key figures outside the farming sector. It mobilizes the knowhow and experience of French farmer organizations, and for the past 40 years has enjoyed the support of grain-grower organizations, in particular Unigrains.

Fert's mission is to aid farmers in developing and emerging countries to improve their living and working conditions as well as their income, thereby helping to boost their country's economy.

Our approach

Our action is part of support for family farming and pays special attention to lifelong learning, gender equality, and farming system sustainability.



Adapting to different contexts

To support farmers in their development, we must understand and adapt to the context in which they operate.





Variations in temperature and rainfall have considerable impact on soil fertility and crops. Support for farmers so that they can anticipate and adapt to climate events requires an advisory service focused on agricultural practices that respect soil life and are waterefficient. That's why agricultural advisers, relay farmers, and farmers are trained in soil health. fertilization practices (including the manufacture of compost and bio-fertilizers and the use of fertilizer plants), agroecological practices, agroforestry, and sound water management.



Some areas have become insecure and therefore no longer accessible to advisers; this is particularly the case in Burkina Faso. This insecurity has a big impact on how the partner FOs operate and in the way that advice given to the producers is implemented. Thanks to support based on empowering organizations and making them self-sufficient, the FOs are managing their own advisory service through relay farmers or local facilitators. They use digital technology to keep in touch with advisers and to maintain remote but regular contact with them.





Protecting against economic instability

The farmers supported by Fert face many economic challenges, including soaring input prices and market instability, to name a few. In response, diversification of production is improving farm resilience. Supporting producers on the entire farm and helping them develop service systems enables them to secure their food and income throughout the year.



Georgia Organizing farmers, a new path for development

In this former Soviet republic, Fert has been helping farmers take charge of their development since 2011.

Improving farm performance

Samtskhe-Javakheti is a mountain region where dairy farming is ubiquitous but underperforming. Since 2011, Fert has been working in partnership with GBDC, an agricultural development organization, with which it has built a dairy advisory service benefiting more than 1,000 farmers. The farmers there have gradually improved their results by working together closely. A sample of 100 farmers is monitored each year. The findings indicate that 67% of them maintain balanced rations, 62% of herds have free and permanent access to water, a third of stables have been refitted, monitoring of herd health status has improved, and the dairy farmers now understand the importance of milk quality. These technical results have led to an 82% increase in the dairy gross margin in four years.

A unique approach in an ex-Soviet country

In a country marked by collectivism, convincing farmers to come together was a major challenge. With a few trailblazers for whom agriculture is a way forward, the Ertoba regional association (*ertoba* means "unity" in Georgian) was created in 2014. Today it brings together 121 farmers, including 12 leaders involved in determining and managing its activities. At their side, GBDC has built up a relationship of



trust and attentiveness, allowing them to offer services adapted to their needs: testing new fodder, training on reproduction, organizing group purchases, leading economic monitoring groups, developing partnerships... with all its services determined by and for the farmers.

2023 – a pivotal year

Building on these achievements, Fert and its partners embarked on a new phase of development in 2023. Thanks to financing from AFD, Fert is supporting Ertoba in extending its action so it can benefit a greater number of farmers and open up to the new sectors of potatoes and beekeeping. Our work also involves boosting the sustainability of the organizations we support. To encourage new ideas, a delegation of 12 Georgians came to France in October 2023, to attend the Livestock Summit in Clermont-Ferrand and to make a study trip to the Savoie region. Fert also mobilized French professionals from BTPL and Adapi for field missions.



What's important is to support farmers in improving their incomes and changing their mindsets. What we've learned is not to go too fast and to build trust.





CEREAL GROWERS ASSOCIATION (CGA)

After two years of experimentation and co-learning with farmers from 12 pilot groups in Laikipia and Meru Counties, a scaling up in agroecology was possible in 2023 thanks to the training for the first 40 CGA relay farmers. Equipped with a starter kit that includes earthworms,

sprayer, fertilizer plant seeds or biopesticides, they can produce organic inputs for their community and help disseminate these techniques.

GROUP FIFATA

In Madagascar, climate change has a big impact on agricultural production. In 2023, Fert provided Fifata with support in developing an educational tool to better understand and deal with climate events. Practical solutions have been developed to improve adaptation, such as climate diagnostics activities, reforestation and large-scale dissemination of agroecological practices, and practical guides and support for better water management.



I was worried about climate change impact, but thanks to the climate tool training by the technicians, we managed to draw up a proposal and then to build a rainwater storage basin in anticipation of the dry season.

COWPEA AND VEGETABLE FOs

In 2023, relay farmers picked out by members of the cowpea and vegetable production FOs were trained and given support to set up local services on soil fertility and animal health issues. The first

services developed concern the production and sale of bio-inputs (compost, bio-fertilizers and biopesticides) and poultry vaccination. There are chicken diseases that we were told could not be treated, but this training enabled me to recognize the disease, so now I can treat the chickens.

Cirad

As part of a cooperation project with the company Ivoire Coton, Cirad requested Fert to monitor a long-term trial that tests different crop rotations (cotton-cerealslegumes) as well as the use of cover plants. This system will help develop mechanized and agroecological farming systems adapted to the farming context of the Savanes District in northern Côte d'Ivoire.



PORO PRODUCER GROUPS

The year 2023 was marked by the launch of an advisory action on legumes (mainly cowpeas), which led to better diversity of production and crop rotation on farms. The technical and economic advice provided in partnership with Ufacoci via a network of relay farmers has also been strengthened to develop corn production.



In 2023, 24 members of the Embombeni cooperative were trained in peanut butter production. With Fert support, the Embombeni and Doroba cooperatives, whose members were trained in yogurt production in 2022, participated

in the Mzuzu agricultural fair and found new customers. Meanwhile, the Umoza cooperative was given support in its search for markets, and it signed its first contract for the sale of tomatoes with a high school.

Recruitment of a specialized technician made it possible to develop a support service for marketing the vegetable products of Urmag members. Many actions were carried out in 2023: development of a price calendar, training of marketing officers within FOs, market analysis, identification of new business partners in formal markets (supermarket purchasing center), creation of a customer database, sharing of information on the prices of the various markets (daily text messages, WhatsApp group), support for negotiation, etc. Producers are very enthusiastic about these various actions.



Many producers are prefinanced by wholesalers and then get ripped off on quantities or prices. We should be financially independent.

COWPEA AND VEGETABLE FOs

In 2023, cowpea bundled sales remained very limited. Producers have used storehouses to build up stocks of cereals and legumes during lean periods and to cope with soaring food prices. In the rural communes of the Centre region, onion production

has developed, and vegetable producers are starting to organize so that they can collectively store their products and obtain a better selling price.

It's true, we can't sell our cowpea production because the prices aren't worth it. We're not going to sell at a loss... But the fact that the cowpeas are stored in the storehouse enables us to keep them for the lean season. Without the storehouse, the cowpea production would have been wasted on social events like weddings and funerals. The storage really helps us women.



GDAEBN set up breeding schemes for two local sheep breeds in 2023. In addition to training the group's technicians, Fert and the Pyrénées-Atlantiques sheep farming center CDEO64 worked with the breeders' collective to define the selection criteria (weight of lambs and quantity of milk). The group then approved the protocols that were tested in the field in the automn. These will have to be rigorously followed by the breeders included in the selection scheme.

ALMOND COOPERATIVES AND PRODUCER GROUPS IN TAZA

The network of relay farmers in Taza started up in 2022 and is gradually taking shape. A Fert-led committee is helping to prepare and then review the technical activities carried out by the relay farmers in their village. The committee has worked since 2023 to provide better framework to the paid activities conducted in other regions. The aim is to ensure that the service continues and that the farmers of the area have priority in benefiting from it. Fert's role is to support the network in drawing up its internal regulations.

At the Fifata group's request, Fert launched a training program in 2013 for Fifata's farmer leaders. Four leader-targeted training courses, now led by Fifata, are training young people, local leaders, regional FO board members, and two-person teams of managers and elected officials. Ten years later, a forwardlooking assessment of the service was carried out with support from lfocap to measure the progress made and adapt the system to new needs.

CFAR DES SAVANES

In 2023, the first short training sessions for working farmers were held, thereby bolstering the CFAR des Savanes training offer. The CFAR farm acts as an important pedagogical tool: it is highly diversified, with livestock, grain and legume, vegetable, and

fruit production workshops. A new dormitory can accommodate the trainee farmers. Continuing education helps to broaden CFAR's reach, with its participants becoming its promoters among their children and within their community.

To optimize the training of young farmers, the third year of the curriculum now consists of a combination of classwork and work experience in the form of internships. Fert and CNEAP carried out several missions to support the development of the system. The year 2023 saw the graduation of the first class fully trained according to the new standards and saw the relevance and effectiveness of these latter confirmed.



Action engineering

Fert is a learning organization. As such, we strive to improve our action and cooperation engineering by continually developing tools and methods and by paying close attention to knowledge management.



An educational tool to illustrate the Fert approach

We produced three animated videos to meet the needs of our field teams. They were designed in collaboration with the Terre Nourricière communication agency. The videos target new technicians and farmers in the countries where we take action, to provide them a simple and visual explanation of the Fert approach. They are available in French, English and eight local languages.

Knowledge management and sharing

Following the collaborative document management platform "IntraFert", we created the "ExtraFert" resource center in early 2023. An internship to back up document management made it possible to identify, sort, and classify all our resources to improve their utilization. All our teams now enjoy access to more than 180 documents produced by Fert and its partners: data sheets, training materials, practical tools, and more.

Studies, in partnership with Institut Agro Montpellier

In 2023, Fert hosted two students from Institut Agro Montpellier Institute's MOQUAS master's degree course, for six-month internships in Taza and Rich, Morocco, respectively. The students conducted in-depth interviews and analyses in partnership with a Moroccan technician, to produce studies helping to better understand local family-farm activities and the downstream sector of the almond and apple value chains. The two studies, the quality of which was praised by the jury during the students' theses presentations, will help advisers to provide better support to producers and their organizations.

Digital tool for advisory outreach

Since 2022, the Fifata Group, Fert, Cirad and an IT service provider have been working together to develop a digital tool ("e-roso", available as an Android app and through a web portal), in order to optimize advisory outreach to producers in Madagascar. With e-roso, farmers' technical and economic data can be analyzed and utilized immediately. When combined with the other tools developed by the Fifata Group and Fert and installed on the mobile tablets of agricultural advisers, e-roso acts as an essential tool for quality agricultural advice.





AgriCord

Fert is a member of the AgriCord international alliance, which brings together 13 agri-agencies in 11 countries: Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Finland, France, Germany, the Netherlands, the Philippines, Senegal, Spain, and Sweden. Supported by their countries' farmer organizations, agri-agencies provide support to FOs and thereby contribute to agricultural development in Africa, Asia, Latin America, and Central Europe.

Institut Agro

Fert is a Board member of Institut Agro's Pôle Tropiques et Méditerranée. The two organizations also work together on three topics: developing methodologies designed for actions in the field; guiding Fert's partner FOs in their strategic decision-making and their development of agricultural services; and further developing training engineering for agricultural development professions in engineering training courses.









Unigrains, a longstanding and growing partnership

Unigrains has supported Fert's action for 40 years, enabling it to work continuously and over the long term. Unigrains and Fert share the same values and same approach: respecting entrepreneurs/farmers who are free and responsible for their decisions, and helping them improve their professional practice. Deepening the mutual knowledge between the Unigrains and Fert teams strengthens the relationship between the two organizations.

Core financial support

Unigrains provides financial support to Fert in the form of an annual grant currently representing 20% of its budget. Fert's Board of Directors determines the allocation of these private funds according to the support needs of our partner organizations' projects in the various countries.

In 2023, the Unigrains' works council and several employees also made a financial contribution to building improved cookstoves, making it possible to reduce wood consumption at the CFAR des Savanes kitchen in Côte d'Ivoire.

Knowledge and skills contribution

In 2023, the Unigrains teams led a cycle of four webinars for the Fert teams, on businesses at Unigrains.

Its two-hour sessions taught about the fundamentals of the basics of investing and explored it through case studies. The Unigrains IT department also provided skills sponsorship, to support the deployment of Fert's accounting software in several countries.

A network of companies

For its 60th anniversary, Unigrains gathered all its French agriculture and agri-food partners for an event at the Carrousel du Louvre in Paris. Jean-François Isambert, Vice-President of Unigrains and President of Fert, spoke there about Fert's actions and support from Unigrains before several hundred business leaders from the agricultural world.

At the beginning of the 1980s, the Céréaliers de France group entrusted Fert with the mission of cooperating with farmers in developing countries who were seeking to organize themselves to become actors of their own development process. It was the conviction of Céréaliers de France that, whatever the country or level of development, farmers are first and foremost entrepreneurs responsible for their choices, and that they can face certain challenges only within the framework of organizations they have created themselves.

In accordance with the initial spirit of Fert, the Board of Directors reasserted

in 2013 that Fert's mission is to support farmers who are seeking to organize themselves to solve any difficulties they may face. Fert's role is to search for solutions along with them and to support them in implementing those solutions. When making its strategic and operational choices, Fert's decisive criterion is thus farmers' expression of needs for support from the French agricultural sector. The effectiveness of Fert's action is measured by the results reached in developing and strengthening farmer organizations.

With this in mind, the Board of Directors has set the following orientations for the coming years:

Regarding Fert's partners in developing countries

Decisions to undertake a new action or to start actions in a new country are made with a view to supporting farmer organizations, be they already existing or yet to be created. Fert is attentive to the needs raised by farmers themselves (e.g., supply of inputs, technical improvements, training, advice, credit, marketing, etc.). Fert provides support when these needs change, for example toward marketing and product quality issues. Accordingly, Fert refrains from responding to requests from countries or donors that position it as an "operator" working in an approach that does not give priority to supporting farmer organizations according to farmers' own expression of their needs.

When, during a project, Fert is led to support local development actions or public financing structures in the rural sector, it does so in collaboration with and in support of local farmer organizations.

Fert will focus its actions in Africa, mainly in the Mediterranean area, sub-Saharan Africa and Madagascar. Fert will be open to activities carried out in other regions, especially if there is an opportunity for partnership with French farmer organizations or companies.

Regarding the French agricultural world

Fert identifies its origin, its *raison d'être*, as well as its means of autonomy within the Céréaliers de France group.

Fert's approach is based on the values, experience and knowhow of the French agricultural sector: mutual aid, solidarity and cooperation. Fert mobilizes the know-how and experience acquired within French farmer organizations through elected and former elected members, employees and former employees. Synergies exist and will be further developed with Afdi, whose approach is complementary. Fert is very attentive to companies' requests. Actions can be considered if the respective approaches of both the company and Fert match up. In each case, Fert shall uphold farmers' interests by guaranteeing an ethical approach.


